

Report on Pupil Premium 2013-14

Pupil Premium funds are allocated by the central government for pupils who have ever been Free School Meals in the last 6 years (FSM Ever6) or who are 'Looked After Children' (children in care or adopted).

In 2013-14 the amount allocated per child has been £900.00 with an additional £300.00 for any LAC (We do not currently have any LAC at Netherbrook). This is a total of £ 113,400.

In 2014-15 the Pupil Premium will rise to £1300.00 per pupil who is 'FSM Ever6'. This is a total of £160,000.

We are currently in the process of creating an itemised spreadsheet to account for all of this funding for the next financial year. This will also reflect SEN funding which is different. An example of this spreadsheet is attached. Ofsted and the government expect this money to be spent to narrow the gap in attainment between disadvantaged pupils (FSM) and other pupils (Not FSM) nationally. The money is intended to be spent on these pupils only (in effect) but other pupils may benefit from it as a matter of course.

During the last 12 months the £113,400 of Pupil Premium funding has been spent on the following:

Action	Impact
Additional teaching sets in Years 3, 4 and 6. £37,500.00	More rapid progress of EFSM pupils has been seen in most year groups. Progress is more rapid for this group this year than previously.
New Reading resources for the Accelerated Reader Scheme: £10,500.00	This reading scheme has improved pupil participation in reading quizzes and has contributed to increases in reading levels.
Funding peripatetic music tuition for FSM pupils. £2,000.00	Pupils with a desire to learn have had their music tuition 50% funded, this has enabled more pupils to continue with lessons. Improving their self esteem and confidence.
Better Reading Partners training for staff. £600.00	Pupils targeted for this support have made better than expected progress against the reading age test at the beginning of the assessment. In ten weeks the average progress is approximately + 6 months.
BRP resources £1,500.00	As above
Parent Workshops: £250.00	Parents that attended felt that these workshops would assist them in helping their child with homework.
1:1 tuition for pupils after school: £1,000.00	Pupils targeted for these 2 groups have made progress against their starting points which would not have been possible otherwise due to timetable restraints.
New resources for EYFS maths and reading: £2,000.00	Progress in maths across the EYFS is markedly improved against this time last year.
Additional Resources for supporting reading and maths in classes: £ 8,500.00	Reading progress has improved in all year groups. Expected progress is being attained across the School currently.
New uniforms: £400.00 (This will be increased	Pupils targeted for this support have

next financial year)	commented on feeling better about themselves and feeling 'less stressed about appearance'.
Staff CPD: £1,000.00	Staff training has targeted developmental marking and gap tasks which have enabled EFSM pupils to make progress in line or better than their peers in most year groups.
Interventions for staff to work specifically with EFSM pupils: <i>approx</i> £5,000.00	Progress has been improved following pupil progress meetings.
New Website: £1,200.00	Not yet ready. Will provide additional home
Upgrades to WiFi infrastructure to allow Notebooks in lessons £5,500.00	Not yet done but budgeted for. This will enable ICT lessons to take place in context in the classroom. Improving learning outcomes for all pupils including EFSM.
Increased hours for specific TAs to work with small groups: approx £5000.00	Pupils have received additional support and have made progress in line with their peers across most year groups.
Full time payment for Mrs Avery (librarian) to provide additional reading clubs and booster groups in reading: £8,500.00(pa).	Higher focus and status attached to reading. G&T groups run and pupils have the option to withdraw books on a fortnightly basis. Reading progress has been good in most year groups.

Total £91,000.00 – The remaining money has been rolled into school improvement in a wide variety of areas.
